“Did Women Have a Printing Revolution?”

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**Monica H. Green** is Professor of History at Arizona State University where she holds affiliate appointments in Women’s and Gender Studies, and the Program in Social Science and Global Health in the School of Human Evolution and Social Change. She teaches courses in Women’s Health, Medieval History, and the History of Science and Medicine. She has published extensively on various aspects of the history of women’s medicine in premodern Europe, including *Women’s Healthcare in the Medieval West: Texts and Contexts* (2000), which was co-winner of the 2004 John Nicholas Brown Prize for the best first book in medieval studies; *The ‘Trotula’: A Medieval Compendium of Women’s Medicine* (2001); a forthcoming book *Making Women’s Medicine Masculine: The Rise of Male Authority in Pre-Modern Gynecology* (Oxford, 2008); and a forthcoming study of the first known malpractice trial of a midwife. She is now undertaking a general study of the medical school of Salerno in the twelfth century and a survey of feminist contributions to medical history. Green serves on the councils of the American Association for the History of Medicine and the Medieval Academy of America, and is President of the Society for Medieval Feminist Scholarship.
