

Alan Gibson is Professor of political science at California State University, Chico. His research interests focus on the political thought of James Madison and the study of the American founding. He has published articles in *Polity*, *History of Political Thought*, *The Review of Politics*, and *The Political Science Reviewer*. Most recently, Gibson is the author of two books on the historiography of the American founding, both published by University Press of Kansas. The first book, *Interpreting the Founding: Guide to the Enduring Debates over the Origins and Foundations of the American Republic*, provides a broad overview of the post-Beardian study of the American founding; the second book, *Understanding the Founding: The Crucial Questions*, examines four central debates generated by the modern study of the American founding. Gibson has held fellowships from the International Center for Jefferson Studies in Charlottesville, Virginia, the James Madison Program in American Ideals and Institutions at Princeton, and the National Endowment for the Humanities. He earned his Ph.D. at the University of Notre Dame
